owns another. It is not *subservience* where one person is doing the bidding of another without intelligent input or interaction. It is not even truly *hierarchical*, since this conjures up notions of a military-style, top-down chain of command in which the soldier is asked to obey, no questions asked, the orders of his superior. None of these labels constitute an accurate description of Scripture with regard to the roles of men and women, nor do they fairly represent the understanding of gender roles set forth in the pages of this book.

Rather, the biblical model for marriage is that of loving complementarity, where the husband and the wife are partners who value and respect each other and where the husband's loving leadership is met with the wife's intelligent response."³
